## *From the Manse*

*Dear Friends,*

*Grace & Peace and Happy New Year!*

A new year always brings a sense of hope, doesn't it? The previous year with all its tragedies, problems, disappointments, sadness is now behind us, and a new year lies before us, no doubt with challenges too (eg the political turbulence surrounding Brexit is still ongoing), but we can make a fresh start and who knows: the future may be brighter; good things may happen, nay, they will surely happen in our lives, in our society and in the wider world!

Of course, when the clock struck midnight on the threshold to 2019—if we were still awake to share a toast to the new year—some of us may have felt that it is all going to be the same; it will be the same story again in the new year .... Nothing changes, nothing will change. And if anything, passing from the season of celebrating the good news of the birth of Jesus with lights, carols, family and friends' get-togethers to the season of the dark, cold, bleak midwinter does not exactly lift our spirits, does it? Also, for some of us the pain, anxiety and sense of loss we felt before and during the Christmas season may be felt just as keenly at the beginning of the new year.

Oh, these January blues.....!!!

When we feel this way, the temptation is to stick with the familiar and the comfortable, to close our doors and crawl back into bed and pull up the covers or to find comfort and security in tradition and familiar routines. The temptation is to let our sadness, our fears or feelings of foreboding overwhelm and paralyse us which may lead us to just give up or giving in to frustration and cynicism, boredom or lethargy.

But then, in church we find ourselves in the season of Epiphany with its emphasis on a light shining in the darkness which reminds us that life continues on, that revelation and growth and new beginnings loom on the horizon, that new roads appear up ahead, new roads that will take

us, if we choose to let them, into new adventures, new challenges, new opportunities to be the people God wants us to be and to live the life God wants us to live.

Epiphany reminds us that life goes on and we are encouraged to get up and go, to rise and shine, knowing that it is God's light that empowers the light to shine within us and also through us into the world. Each of us has a new road ahead of us in the new year. It is another road, a different road than any we have travelled on before. As we step unto that road, not knowing what we may find, not knowing exactly where we are going, we can be comforted in knowing that for sure, the light goes with us, leading us, guiding us, showing us the way. God will be with us on our journeys down that new road ahead.

Some of us may be thinking, "Well that's fine for the younger people, but I'm too old to be thinking about starting off on any new roads." Yet, *"there is grace here not just for the young, but for the old, or older, as well. It's not hard, is it, to see the possibility of new life and new beginnings, when we are young or in the lives of the young? It may be more difficult to imagine such grace and newness when we are well beyond that time of life, when the future is no longer so open or full of promise as it once seemed. All the more reason then to receive the gift of this part of the story, the promise of grace and new life, not only for the young, but for no-longer-young as well. Grace happens, surprise and new life can come, no matter what our age. Look today for the surprise of God's grace in your life, no matter what age you are."* (Tony Robinson in UCC Daily Devotional)

May the God of surprises surprise us and lead us forward "through the bad and good... travelling along with us" in the New Year!

### **Morning at the Manse**

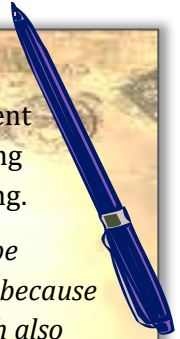

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# Brexit Borders and Belonging conference at Queens Foundation in December 2018

I had a chance to attend this conference in December, thanks to the invitation from Michael Jagessar. The conference took place over three days and I was able to listen to a wide range of speakers from the URC and affiliated organisations. This included the viewpoints from Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland. There were also some speakers from outside the UK. This is the latest in a series of conferences which Michael organises for the URC nationally, inviting also local participation of which I was a part.

I enjoyed the conference and have made some new friends. I have also some ideas for things I want to bring to Weoley Hill and the Cadbury Pastorate during 2019. I will keep this short now. I want to mention two sets of initials to make sure we are all aware of them.

**J.P.I.T. Joint Public Issues Team** – This is a joint team on public issues between the URC and other free churches working two ways – to share information with us and to be a critical friend to the government. I think there is useful information for us here.

CWM Europe is made up of five member churches and is currently focused on developing missional congregations, equipping missional leaders and a dynamic youth programme.

The members of the Europe Region are the UK and the Netherlands.

## Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2019

As every year, the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is from 18-25 January. The theme this year is “Only Justice” and resources have been prepared by Christians from Indonesia, the largest country in South East Asia, made up of more than 17,000 islands, 1,340 different ethnic groups and over 740 local languages, united by one national language Bahasa Indonesia. With some 86% of its 260 million people estimated to be Muslim, it has the largest Islamic population of any country. About 10% of Indonesians are Christian. Indonesians have lived by the principle of *gotong royong* which is to live in ‘solidarity and by collaboration’, regarding all Indonesians as brothers and sisters.

But *gotong royong* sits ill at ease with the neo-liberal approach to economics that has led to economic growth, and corruption infecting politics and business, often with devastating effects on the environment. Meanwhile those who are supposed to promote justice and protect the weak fail to do so. As a consequence, a country rich in resources bears the burden of many people living in poverty. Particular ethnic and religious groups are often associated with wealth in ways that have fed tensions.

The Christians of Indonesia found that the words of Deuteronomy, ‘Justice, and only justice, you shall pursue...’(see Deut. 16:18-20) spoke powerfully to their situation.
