Short Reflection

When the people of Israel settled in the land of "milk and honey" to which they had been led by God, there was a ritual that they were commanded by God to perform. They had to bring a basket of the first fruits of the land to the temple as part of the annual harvest festival. This was to remember their story of liberation and to express their gratefulness to God. But it was more than that....

The people would process together to the temple to bring their harvest offering. It was not a charitable donation or a gift from a generous heart. It was a requirement, a commandment. And why was this so important? Yes, the harvest produce was distributed among the temple servants, the orphans, widows and resident aliens, but that was not the primary purpose. This was a basket of first fruits at harvest demanded of the people of God who lived in the land God had given them.

While the people had wandered for many years in the wilderness, they knew (or got to know) their dependence on God. And as they were brought into this new land, they still knew that they needed God. But then, as they were settling down, things would change. For as a community gets organized, becomes an established and thriving nation, there is always the temptation that it can grow arrogant and puffed up with self importance. The people may consider their success as their due and can easily forget about God. And forget about the land and the good creation that sustain them. They may forget their dependency, forget that they are not self sufficient.

We know about this tendency. We know the temptation to become self satisfied and think that our success is purely of our own making. It is easy to adopt the assumption that we are in control. That one basket of the fruit of the land, brought to the priest to be placed on the altar at the harvest festival, that one simple requirement was an act of resistance against the delusion of self-sufficiency, of self importance and of independence.

That one simple commandment, to bring an offering of produce, was to be a reminder that all of the success and prosperity of the people was dependent on the gifts that they have been given: land, water, animals, the web of life, consciousness and creativity.....They had to acknowledge that these were given and received....and so do we.

Creation in all is abundance and diversity is not of our own making; we do not create it. We are completely dependent on the web of life. We are dependent on each other. We must live in cooperation, mutuality, and respect if we are to survive.

Just the basket of fruit. The produce of the land. The act of making an offering of thanksgiving. It is demanded because it is a powerful antidote to misplaced pride and the delusion of being self reliant.

Our Harvest thanksgiving each year, as well as our weekly offering, is not simply a nice gesture of generosity out of the goodness of our hearts. This is an act of acknowledging, being honest about all that we are given. It is a powerful way of symbolizing that we know we are not self made or self sufficient; we are not independent. We are all beneficiaries of the blessings of God's good creation. All the gifts that we are offered we receive with gratitude.

So in our Harvest thanksgiving we resist the selfishness, arrogance, sense of superiority and individualism that too often dominates our society and plagues our times. In our Harvest thanksgiving we acknowledge and celebrate our dependence on nature, the air, water, soil, plants, animals, beauty, consciousness, creativity as well as our mutual dependence. *We give thanks for all these gifts, freely offered to*

us from the hand of LOVE (with capital letters). Thanks be to God. Amen.
