Reflection

Blessed are the poor in spirit, blessed are those who mourn, blessed are the meek, blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, blessed are the merciful, blessed are the pure in heart, blessed are the peacemakers and the persecuted. I am sure that if you were compiling a list of blessed people, you would hesitate to include these on your list. We may say that we would like to be merciful, pure in heart, peacemakers, hungry and thirsty for righteousness, but the weakness, sadness, persecution and powerlessness of the blessed ones is not something we aspire to. Rather, we try to avoid it and shield ourselves from it.

However, it may well be that Jesus is not telling us that we have to be meek and poor in spirit but rather he is saying something about God. God who does not *demand* people to be weak and vulnerable but who *is* with the mournful, humble and persecuted. Even, and especially, God is with those who may wonder if they have been forgotten by everyone, even the Divine. When we find ourselves among their number, we too need to be reminded that God is surely there with us, even when we are struggling, feeling alone and hopeless.

On this Sunday in the church year, we remember those who have died, in our church, in our family, among our friends and neighbours. Perhaps we are counted among the blessed who are mourning. Also those we remember today may be the people we know and love who are ill or struggling, and this year, or at least the last eight months, have certainly been very challenging, very tough for many, near and far away, and for some among us too. But the good news is that God is present in our remembering and is present with those whom we remember.

And we do not only remember people, we also remember the ups and downs we have lived through and still experience. We remember what we have lost, perhaps the freedom to move around or travel, or celebrations with family and friends, or a job or voluntary activity, or an important medical appointment, or hope, joy, confidence.......Whether a major loss or what may only seem trivial in the larger picture of the havoc caused by the corona pandemic, it is something we mourn or are sad about. But we also remember what we have "found" over the last few months as we may have discovered blessedness in the kindness of friends and strangers, in the care and dedication of health workers and carers, in new ways of doing things and possibilities for positive change, or in a hunger and thirst for justice, etc. God was and is there too, for he is present in the brokenness of the world and equally in the

beauty of the world and its people. Surely, God is present in our mourning and in our gladness and rejoicing! Sharing the stories of the highs and lows of our lives, of the people who surround us in the cloud of witnesses, of past and present, we recognize God's presence and Christ meeting us in our lives, as Jim Burklo expresses in a rewriting of the hymn "For all the saints" (which we will sing later). For all the ways we help each other grow/As we share stories, moments high and low/The face of Christ among us now will show. We sing alleluia, alleluia. For all the people that our church holds dear/For every precious memory made here/For those we serve in love, both far and near. We sing alleluia, alleluia. For times when silence is the truest word/Or when the prophet's thund'ring voice is heard/For tears and laughter that our church has stirred. We sing alleluia, alleluia. In all our struggles, God will lead us through/And give us strength to do what we must do/To gain the peace and justice we pursue. We sing alleluia, alleluia.
