From the Minister's study

Dear Friends.

For the All Saints service on the 1st of November I asked the Weoley Hill congregation to write down on a greeting card who or what they had *lost* over the past year as well as what they may have *found*. In telling and sharing the stories of how we have lived, and continue to live, through these challenging times we recognize that while our experiences may differ we are united in empathy, faith and love, journeying together with hope that God is present with us and will lead us to a new day—and new stories!

There are some things that I have "lost" or that I have missed (some trivial, no doubt) as well as many good things that I have found or discovered. But let me tell you that one of the church activities I have particularly missed is the monthly discussion meeting at the Manse. Reading articles together on current political, social, religious, ethical etc issues and sharing our thoughts and stories I find hugely inspiring. Especially when discussing ethical issues and we come with our different experiences and perspectives, the conversation can be very interesting and thought-provoking.

As it does not seem likely that we can meet anytime soon, I have a collection of articles from newspapers and magazines that I keep, hoping that when we do meet again they may still be relevant. One of the articles is an interview with Rutger Bregman (a Dutch historian) in *Positive News* (July-Sept 2020). In his new book, *Humankind. A Hopeful History*, he argues that far from being self-serving, humans are kind and cooperative by nature. And his response to one question particularly caught my attention. He is asked "What is the result of our institutions being designed around how we view human nature?" And his response is: "I think our view of human nature tends to be a self-fulfilling prophecy.... Throughout history, a cynical view of human nature has always been a legitimisation of power. Because if people can't trust each other, then they need powerful people to look over

them. But if we can trust each other, we can live in a much more egalitarian, genuinely democratic society." And further along in the interview he says that "most people are pretty decent, but power corrupts."

This made me think of the church as an institution and how, since the Middle Ages—since Augustine taught the doctrine of original sin—the sinful nature of humanity has been dominant in church teaching. And this has given the church power as pronouncing humanity sinful (from birth, not choice) it claimed a monopoly on salvation. "The doctrine of original sin gives the church a permanent clientele in a salvation enterprise, with no competition."* And we know what this can lead to!

I also think the language in our church liturgies and hymns, which constantly reinforces guilt and shame by reminding us that we are sinners, is not helpful. Of course, we do sin (Greek = hamartia which means "missing the mark") but we are not inherently sinful. "The emphasis on sin has meant that Christianity has come to be seen as lifedenying rather than life-enhancing...perhaps the most negative view of human nature of any religion." †Yes, there are countless examples of people who are selfish and cruel, doing all kinds of terrible things, but I am sure, and agree with Bregman, that it is far more common that people are decent and kind, and sometimes even heroic. Some of them we revere as saints, but I think it is far better to say that we are all saints and sinners.

And what does "salvation" mean, if we have a more positive view of humanity and its potential to do good, recognizing that sin is not the be-all and end-all of our human condition? Well, that is a question that cannot be answered in one sentence but what I can say is that in the New Testament salvation is about transformation in our individual and collective life, repentance of sin being following the way of Jesus, responding to the message of the kingdom of God. May it be so!

And on another note: I write this while in a weeks' time an important question will be answered: who will be the next president in the United

States? Why is it so important? Because the result of the election will not only determine the future of the United States but it will have an impact on the whole world and many of the global issues we are facing. Never has the choice been so stark between the two candidates, never has the country seemed so divided, and perhaps never have the stakes been so high, so we will await the result with some fear and trembling!

I am reminded of a reading in the Siddur Lev Chadash (the prayerbook of Liberal Judaism) which is relevant as we are part of a world community; we are not independent but interdependent. Suppose there are several people in a boat, and one of them takes a drill, and starts to bore a hole, and the others protest: "What are you doing?" If the one drilling answers: "What business is it of yours? Am I not boring under myself?", surely they will retort: "But it is our business, because when the water comes in, it will sink the boat with all of us in it!"

Please keep the US election and its (hopefully peaceful) aftermath in your prayers!

FWO—CLAIMING TAX

Just a reminder that if you are giving to church via FWO , and your tax status changes , it is important to inform David Marlow or Emlyn Evans. (Bournville & Weoley Castle contributors, inform your own treasurer.) For taxpayers, the church is able to claim an extra 25p for every £, but if you cease to be a taxpayer, we need to change your claim status on the FWO system.

GASDS

For FWO giving for non-taxpayers, and for all cash just placed directly on the offering plate, we can also claim tax back under the GASDS scheme, as long as the amount given is £30 or less.

It also applies to contactless card transactions, but we cannot claim tax for cheque payments under the GASDS system.

Our Monday and Friday Day Centres for housebound senior citizens started as planned in October. The activities are taking place in the Sanctuary to allow people to be sufficiently far apart, which was impossible in the Lounge. The lunches are served in the Hall but with well-separated tables. Despite these changes, those who come are very happy to be back and the users are prepared to pay a slightly increased subs to cover the cost of transport by Shencare, who cannot of course fill their minibuses to capacity. Elite Dance & Karate continue, but we cannot see safe ways of re-starting the other weekday activities. With case numbers continuing to increase, it seems more likely that further restrictions will come in.



A side effect of the change of location of the Day Centres, is that comfy D.C. armchairs are available for some of the congregation on Sundays! We continue to plan for services in person at 11 AM at WCCC on the 2nd (Communion) & 4th Sundays of the month. Nov 8th will be a Remembrance Sunday service, led by Chris Miles & Leonora, and on the 22nd Frank Challenor will lead our service. The 29th is a joint Pastorate service at 10.30 at Weoley Hill, led by one of the Moderators of the URC General Assembly Mr Peter Pay. For other Sundays, we rely on the online services. In the past couple of months, we have had two lively services led in person by Rev. Peter Cruchley.

Harvest Sunday: 100 kilos of staples were delivered to the B30 Foodbank, plus fresh food taken to the Salvation Army Citadel to be used in their food parcel deliveries. The flowers and pot plants were shared with those who can't join us for worship just yet.

Proposals and plans: Ann Evans mentioned an idea from Elders when she last led worship, that besides phoning one another, we arrange to walk (socially distanced) with people who are on their own and provide health benefits as well as company. We hope to set up the Easter Cross for Remembrance Sunday through Remembrance Day itself. You are invited to add a felt poppy or a flower during this period. Looking further ahead, we hope to have an outdoor carol service on 23 December (torches recommended) so that more can attend safely, and the Crib Service on the 24th will be outdoors, weather permitting. *Do you have a garden gazebo we can borrow for these?* Please let Alan know.

JKH floor: The hole has been filled in, but more cracks that were discovered when the blocks were lifted still need to be dealt with. The existing bitumen is difficult to remove so further work needs to be done to seal and apply screed to the floor using the chemicals that do not react with the bitumen. There is a suggestion by the insurers that the crack in the floor is caused by trees close to the hall, but we do not think so. Synod has approved our application for a 25% grant towards the cost but it will be higher because of the extra work. We hope synod will give us the extra grant when the total costing is determined.
