Where do we meet the risen Christ?

Dear Friends,

Alleluia, Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! That will be our proclamation again on Easter day when we hope to gather in our church carparks for an outdoor service, at Weoley Hill at 10.30am and at Weoley Castle at 11am. And as the Bournville church has no carpark their members are invited to join either of the two Cadbury pastorate outdoor services.

Christ is risen, we proclaim. But where do we meet the risen Christ? Well, let me tell you.....

Do you know that every Saturday, as our Jewish sisters and brothers meet in the Synagogue, they read from the Torah, the five books of Moses? First Genesis, then Exodus, followed by Leviticus, Number and finally Deuteronomy. Three years it takes to read through the five books, and after three years they start again from the beginning: "In the beginning God created..." The three-year cycle ends with Deuteronomy 34 from which I quote the sentence "*Then Moses, the servant of the Lord died...at the Lord's command. He was buriedbut no one knows his burial place to this day*" (Deut. 34: 5-6)

Yes, the Torah ends with the death of Moses, one of the greatest leaders and prophets in the history of the people of Israel. Every three years the weekly readings in the synagogue end with the account of the death of Moses whose tomb has never been found. Isn't that interesting? Doesn't it make us think of the gospel of Jesus Christ which also ends with the death of the greatest teacher and prophet in *our* history, whose tomb was found but...it was found empty. So where is Jesus? Where is Moses?

Where is Moses? That is the question left open at the end of the Torah. And what do our Jewish brothers and sisters do? They start to read the Torah from the beginning again. Where is Jesus? That is the question we are faced with as we come to the end of the gospel, especially as we read the gospel of Mark. (This lectionary year we read through the gospel of Mark, my favourite gospel!) Where is Jesus if he is not found in the empty tomb? The angel, that is, the young man wearing a white robe that the women find in the tomb gives us the answer: *"Jesus of Nazareth...he is not here.....he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him"* (Mk 16: 6-7)

Galilee? That brings us back to the beginning of the gospel, the beginning of Jesus' ministry. *"Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God and saying, 'The time is fulfilled and the kingdom of God has come near'"* (Mk 1:14)

Yes, just like the Jews and their Torah, so we are redirected to the beginning. It is no use looking for a tomb, or to look for someone in an empty tomb; that is not where we are going to find the one whom we are looking for. So where do we find him? We find him by rereading the Torah, by rereading the gospel, right from the beginning. That is where we will find him, as we read again and again and again.....

Each time as we read the Torah again, as we read the gospel again, we make new discoveries, we find new depths of meaning, we gain more insight and we get the spiritual nourishment that sustains us in the living of our days in the words and teachings that are wonderfully life-affirming and life-giving... What do you think? That when we come to the end of the gospel we can set it aside, just like we do when we have finished reading a novel? The story is finished, Jesus is raised and we now fix our gaze upon Christ who has journeyed from death to life, who is lifted up, glorified and "sitting on the right hand of the Father" as the church proclaims? No, the risen Christ *"is going ahead of you, to Galilee"* Christ who is raised can be found in the reading of the gospel. (Remember that Mark and the other gospel writers who recorded the ministry of Jesus always had in mind that Jesus was the risen Christ)

Christ who is raised can be found in the faithful reading and rereading of the gospel, the good news of the kingdom. For some that is **not** enough. They want more, a more risen and exalted Christ. And when they do not find him in the gospel they may invent him, capture him in doctrines and traditions. Then the risen Christ becomes Lord, King, Judge, sitting on a heavenly throne, or he becomes a personal Saviour, saving some and sitting in judgement of others.

We cannot find a Christ who is more risen than the one whose words and actions touch, move and inspire us as we read and study the Bible, alone or together. It is in the Bible that we meet the risen Christ; in the Bible the God of life, whom we know in Jesus Christ, is revealed in simple words, grand narratives, short parables, straightforward teachings, beautiful poetry, cries of anger and revolt, and in what is left unsaid. God in Christ reveals himself in these in order to offer life, life in abundance, to all.

Yes, we have rejected him, crucified him but he is gracious to us and invites us to start again. "I go ahead of you to Galilee" I want to start again with you. You did not want me, I who am the resurrection and life? Do you realize that you reject life in abundance? Do you regret it? Let us start all over again, you and I, from the beginning. And again, and again, and again

The resurrection is not the end and does not come at the end; it is the beginning, a new beginning. Where do we meet the risen Christ? Take up your Bible and go to Galilee. There you will find him!

Hoping to see many of you at Easter and with all best wishes for the glorious new day!

URC West Midlands Synod Saturday 13 March 2021

Reflections for Weoley Hill URC and the Cadbury Pastorate

The meeting was held remotely using Zoom, which worked reasonably well with some glitches. It was a long time to be on Zoom, even with breaks for coffee and lunch.

There are quite a lot of points where it is useful to refer to some web links which will as far as possible be gathered as an appendix rather than break the flow of this account.

This report covers highlights in each topic. More information is available from John and Ann.

I hope that as things open up we will have a chance to meet face to face with people from churches across the Synod. I would like to explore linking with one or more churches in a rural part of the Synod. (John)

Opening worship This led directly to the **Birmingham Charter** on the issue of racial justice. We are asked as a church to consider adopting this.

Eco Synod News The West Midlands Synod is the first to achieve a Bronze Award. Churches are encouraged to apply for awards and also to progress to higher awards. Would you be interested in joining an Eco synod steering group, contact our Green Apostle, see below

Trust Finance and Property Some churches may be able to apply for money under **Business Interruption Insurance**. This will depend on which insurer they are with. Advice is available for filling in the forms. It is considered a **duty of trusteeship** to apply where this is possible. Our Elders are the trustees. **Ministry Development** The present system of **Area Ministers** is being phased out and support will be available for ministers from the moderator and peers.

Worship during lockdown We were able in breakout sessions and report backs to share the diverse experience across the Synod. There is a set of **Synod Video Stories** available. There are also some **Information Guides**.

Opening for worship This is a matter for the elders in each church to consider. It is clear that there is a wide variation in what is going to happen across the Synod, with varying local circumstances. Safety is of paramount importance.

Modern Day Slavery Mervyn Davies introduced this with a moving address. The Synod adopted a proposed policy which will was also forwarded to general assembly. There is also a recommendation that this should be included in Safeguarding Policy for churches.

In summary:

The Synod urges churches to adopt the statement and will seek to direct churches to resources....

The Synod, in conjunction with other partners, will endeavour to provide training...

The Synod will encourage local churches to make helpline numbers and contact details of support organisations available in their premises so that any victims using the premises may find access to them.

Nominations: Resolution 4*That Revd. Steve Faber be nominated to be Moderator of General Assembly for 2022-23.* The Moderator withdrew while this was discussed. There was a lot of discussion

of the responsibilities involved and the consequences for the West Midlands Synod. The nomination was approved.

General Assembly & Synod meetings General Assembly in 2021 will be held remotely. The next Synod meeting will be in October 2021 and hopefully in person but it will not be the residential one as planned; that will take place in October 2022 all being well.
