From the Interim Moderator—

How long, O Lord!

As Christians we should be used to waiting... and waiting... and waiting... and waiting... Advent is the season of expectation and preparation, when we, the Church, prepare to celebrate the coming (adventus) of Christ in his incarnation – his 'becoming flesh'. We also look ahead to Christ's final advent as judge at the end of time.

Yet, other than a brief pause, often on the first Sunday in Advent, we tend to move quickly over the judgement and distil Advent into a far more relatable waiting period and for a far more acceptable gift, that of a wee baby.

Indeed, in the gospels we hear warnings that despite bad things happening, we cannot know when Jesus will return - and we certainly shouldn't see the bad things happening as a sign that Jesus is coming back. More than that, I guess, there is enough turmoil in the world to worry about without thinking too much about 'end times'.

What can we take from Advent if we are to avoid either falling into the doom of the inevitability of wars and disasters or the overly sentimental and sanitised crib scene with optional tinsel and fairy lights?

Perhaps, we can honour the coming of the Christ-child, not by simply opening the doors of the Advent calendar each day or burning down an Advent candle but by living an active Advent? It could be a small act of kindness one day, a prayer for someone you know is struggling (or even for someone you struggle to like) on another day, then a favour for a neighbour, or perhaps sending someone a card or note of thanks or to say you are thinking of them.

West Midlands Synod Meeting 17 and 18 October 2025

Ann and I attended the residential meeting at the Hilton Birmingham Metropole hotel at the NEC. Thank you to Ann for navigating as I had assumed the meeting was at the same hotel as previously, which was not correct.

The hotel provided a good environment for the meeting.

The meeting had a mixture of worship, full sessions and workshops some which happened in several of the sessions. We had a keynote speaker on the Friday evening after our excellent 3 course meal. It was Revd Dr Jonathon Oloyde who is behind the National Day of Prayer initiative.

I attended sessions on the Climate Crisis, Local Church Safeguarding and Pioneering.

Ann attended Climate Crisis and Ecological emergency. We need to get the word out to community and engage with it and encourage more green issues. An article from this is in this edition of the newsletter. More next time. Synod is in the process of setting up Eco church grants so watch this space. Ann also attended Greening your Church which is also Eco oriented and presented by members of Wombourne church who have received the gold Eco award. There is a book 'Making your church sustainable' by Nigel Walter and Ann will try to get a copy. Her final workshop was also Pioneering and led jointly by 2 Pioneer workers one based at Weoley Castle church and the other in the Northfield community. Their role is to meet with people outside the church environment and form a 'church' which fits their needs. Synod has a pioneer representative, Angi Barker based in Winson Green.

There was a business meeting held by Zoom on 23rd October. I forgot to attend this. I understand that the business resolutions were all passed. There are opportunities for churches to bid for resources as a result.

Addressing Climate Change and Enhancing Biodiversity Climate Change (Presented at Synod)

Here are some of the ways our community can influence climate change:

- (a). Reduce Your Carbon Footprint
- Shift to Sustainable Transportation Choose walking, cycling, public transport, or electric vehicles to cut back on fossil fuel emissions.
- Improve Energy Efficiency Use LED bulbs, insulate homes, switch to energy-efficient appliances, and consider installing solar panels.

• Embrace Renewable Energy. If possible, switch your home energy provider to one that sources from wind, solar, or hydro.

(b).Compensate for the Carbon you Produce.

• My wife and I donate to Ecologi.com which manages a range of carbon impact projects and which helps us compensate for almost half a ton of our carbon footprint every month.

(c). Change Food Habits

- Eat a Plant-Rich Diet Livestock farming is a major emitter of methane. Reducing meat and dairy consumption lowers greenhouse gases.
- Minimize Food Waste Compost leftovers, store food properly, and only buy what you'll use-landfilled waste produces methane.
- Buy Fairtrade to help people in the developing world impacted by Climate change and low income.

(d). Consume in Ways which Help the Planet

- Buy local products to reduce food miles
- Buy Less and Buy Better Support brands with strong environmental ethics.
- Prioritize durability over disposability.
- Support Circular Economy Practices Repair, reuse, donate, or recycle rather than discard products.

(e). Educate and Advocate

- Stay Informed Read up on climate science and policy. Share facts with friends and family.
- Push for Policy Change Vote for leaders committed to climate action and engage in community or online campaigns.

The next family service is planned for January 11th, but arrangements on following Sundays may be a bit fluid, because of the expected arrival of Susie's baby just after that.

The 'Warm Welcome' on Fridays with food pantry, café and free lunch will continue as usual, with the last one before Christmas on Friday Dec 19th. There will be a gap of two weeks before it restarts on January 9th.

The Day Centres and Lunch Clubs are planning a Christmas Dinner at Church on Monday 15th December – limited places - need to book with Mary. The last DC/LC will be on Friday Dec

19th, re-starting on Monday January 5th. We are grateful to Stephen Burnand and Kim Benson for filling in some of the gaps in the kitchen caused by Chris Hopkins' absences.

Other Christmas Activities. Look out for the 'Advent Christmas Trees' that will appear on the Square and outside various Churches. All four Churches are contributing to a 'Christmas Card' (containing a Christmas message and detail about the Churches' activities), which will be delivered to some 5000 houses in the area. 'Love Weoley Castle' will once again be organising a personalised 'Letter from Santa' to a couple of hundred local children, whose parents enter their details onto the local Facebook page.

News of the Fellowship

Beckie Reay, a member of the Tuesday Knit & Natter Group gave birth to much-wanted son Oliver and brought the little mite along to the group a couple of days later for everyone to meet him.

Latha (who volunteers at Church on Mondays, Wednesdays & Fridays) has been told that she can choose to have limited leave to remain in the UK rather than going through a Tribunal hearing for asylum. This leave can be renewed every 2½ years on a 10-year route to permanent residence. This is good news for her and especially for the children who can feel at home at last. However, let us hope that our seemingly heartless Home Secretary does not stretch that 10 years out still longer!
