## Scripture Reading

Mark 16: 1-8

## Reflection

As you know, each of the four Gospels tells the story of Easter and each tells it differently. Mark’s gospel is the briefest in its description; for Mark it is enough to provide us with only a few details in the eight verses that he writes about Jesus’ resurrection. Matthew needs 20 verses to describe what happened three days after.....and Luke and John spend at least fifty verses writing about the resurrection. Surprisingly, Mark does not report an appearance of the risen Lord. He just leaves us wondering.....Did the

resurrection really happen? And is an empty tomb enough to persuade, to stir new life in the followers of Jesus? I like this short resurrection account, just because it is so plain and simple. It plainly tells us the truth about our faith and reminds us of our very human responses to the amazing and troubling experiences in our lives. It seems very real. “So they went out and fled from the tomb, in terror and amazement and said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid”. The women, the first witnesses to the resurrection were terrified, surprised and stunned into silence. We can never predict our own reaction and behaviour in difficult and surprising situations, but I guess many of us would react the same. As Mark describes the scene, the (male) disciples have already given up and are nowhere to be found. The women do not really get it either. They arrive at the tomb, expecting to find a body that they can anoint. When the young man in white tells them to go and tell the disciples that Jesus will meet them in Galilee, they run away and withdraw in silence, too afraid to move or to speak.

The women were not expecting the resurrection. They came at first light, arriving quietly at the tomb just as the sun came over the hills. As they walked along, they must have felt many emotions....anger, fear, shock and deep grief. This was a time in Israel’s history of violence and repression, so what must they have been thinking as they made their way through the night? They came to the tomb to anoint the body with oil. They were expecting to have life go on as usual, even in the midst of the death-dealing powers that they had witnessed a few days ago. Can you imagine how their lives were changed on that day? As we think of the world, all the pain and suffering during the ongoing pandemic, and as we consider the challenges of life on this Easter Sunday, we can look toward the women at the tomb on that first Sunday. They were certainly full of sorrow and frightened, but they somehow managed to “hang in there” and keep going. Throughout this Holy Week, the women stayed at the cross, it was the women who quietly watched as they laid Jesus in the tomb and it was the women who came early in the morning to anoint him. Somehow, amidst the confusing events of those days, there were those who maintained a quiet, faithful and stubborn presence. It took an earthquake, a stranger in the tomb and a missing body to send them fleeing, but we know that they would find the courage and confidence again to move forward into the rest of their lives and into the world.

The first words that were spoken to the women amaze us even today; “Do not be afraid.” Over and over again in the Gospels we hear these words spoken. “Do not be afraid.” Your life is going to change in ways you never dreamed of. “Do not be afraid.” There is new hope. “Do not be afraid, in grief, sorrow, pain, I will be with you.” And each one spoken to finds a way to move forward into newness of life. We know that God is present in our lives this morning, not only in the joyful alleluias that we sing and the glory of Easter. God is present and persists in our bewilderment and fear; God persists, bringing hope out of hopelessness, helping us to go forward, even when we are gripped by terror and grief. God persists when we are broken by pain and suffering and utterly overwhelmed by the sheer force of the power of death around us. God persists in love, with love. *Who shall separate us from the love of God in Christ? Will hardship or distress or persecution....or peril. No, nothing can separate us....*

As the women flee the tomb, in terror and amazement, perhaps it is what all of us want to know and desire to feel at Easter. Utter amazement...wonder! There is in this moment, holy awe. The wonderful thing about Mark is that he circles around and brings us back to exactly the place he begins. There was awe and wonder at the beginning of Jesus’ ministry, and so there is at the end....“Go,” the angel told the women. “Tell everyone that he goes to Galilee, ahead of you, there you will meet him.” Yes, we remember the beginning of Mark’s gospel, “Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God....!” That is where we are going to meet him.....as we follow him.....as he goes before us.....to Galilee and into all the world proclaiming the good news of the kingdom of God. We meet him when we follow him as he goes before us, on the way of the cross.....and of the resurrection!

What will we do? Flee or follow? “We do not entirely understand what resurrection means, but if we understand the story, we should be holding fast to what we do know; that Jesus goes before us, summoning us to the way of the cross. That is the hardest thing about the ending of Mark; not tragedy, not victory, but the ending challenges us to follow anew.” I guess that we are here this morning because we have decided that we will not flee but we will follow. And as followers we rejoice: Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!
