From the Editor —

Dear all

First, an apology for something written on short notice, but the scheduled letter-writer hasn't been able to write on in time to get the newsletter ready for the first of February.

It is tempting just to quote the whole sermon of US Episcopal Bishop Mariann Edgar Budde, partly as an excellent example of speaking truth to power and also of reclaiming an official occasion like a national prayer service for the Word of God.

I will quote some of her words on unity, which are very wise and very appropriate for us as we work towards a new Pastorate and think of the futures of our congregations.

... we have gathered this morning to pray for unity as a nation—not for agreement, political or otherwise, but for the kind of unity that fosters community across diversity and division, a unity that serves the common good.

Rather, unity is a way of being with one another that encompasses and respects differences, that teaches us to hold multiple perspectives and life experiences as valid and worthy of respect; that enables us, in our communities and in the halls of power, to genuinely care for one another even when we disagree....

Unity at times, is sacrificial, in the way that love is sacrificial, a giving of ourselves for the sake of another. Jesus of Nazareth, in his Sermon on the Mount, exhorts us to love not only our neighbors, but to love our enemies, and to pray for those who persecute us; to be merciful, as our God is merciful, and to forgive others, as God forgives us. Jesus went out of his way to welcome those whom his society deemed as outcasts.

Now I grant you that unity, in this broad, expansive sense, is aspirational, and it's a lot to pray for—a big ask of our God, worthy of the best of who we are and can be. But there isn't much to be gained by our prayers if we act in ways that further deepen and exploit the divisions among us. Our Scriptures are quite clear that God is never impressed with prayers when actions are not informed by them. Nor does God spare us from the consequences of our deeds, which, in the end, matter more than the words we pray.

What are the foundations of unity? Drawing from our sacred traditions and texts, let me suggest that there are at least three.

The first foundation for unity is honoring the inherent dignity of every human being....

A second foundation for unity is honesty in both private conversation and public discourse....

A third foundation for unity is humility, which we all need, because we are all fallible human beings....

This is intended as encouragement, not criticism! We will have to work out and increase the gracious Christian unity which is so much greater than mere uniformity, a gift of God's Grace, and which is part of our Reformed tradition, to form a workable, working pastorate and to find ways of spreading the Word and growing Christ's church in this area.

- Everyone who is suffering through this winter, whether storm damage, cold home, financial hardship, mental illness, one of the many diseases going round....
- All victims of violence, of injustice, of hatred and prejudice, of poverty, of climate change, of preventable illness....
- We give thanks for everyone who does the Lord's work of loving-kindness, unifying, caring, healing, strengthening, striving for justice and peace, preserving the world He has given us....



Pastorate News

South & Central Birmingham Pastorate

(Carrs Lane, Cotteridge, Weoley Castle & Weoley Hill)

Update: The Vacancy Committee met on 22 January. The individual church sections of the profile are ready or nearly ready, and a map will be included to show where the churches are. (Google Maps is very misleading, showing the area of Weoley Castle down in Shenley Green and Weoley Hill as just a bus stop.) We need to get our areas on the map—literally! The summary form, which prospective candidates use to decide which profiles they want to see, is also nearly complete, so we hope it will all go to the Moderators before the summer.

Revd Melanie Smith, the Interim Moderator, led worship in Weoley Castle last month and will lead worship and communion at Weoley Hill on 2 March. The committee also discussed ways we could worship together without leaving churches closed to visitors on a Sunday morning. Afternoon or evening worship in the summer was suggested, possibly Pentecost or Trinity Sunday. Any suggestions?

Other matters discussed included the purchase of a new Manse please keep your eyes out for suitable properties, preferably between the Bristol and Pershore Roads. The URC policy asks for 3 bedrooms, a separate room for a study, preferably downstairs, and separate reception rooms to allow for meetings and family life. (Purchase of a new Manse doesn't have to wait on the sale of the former Weoley Hill Manse.) No one has yet agreed to be the Pastorate banker, so Melanie explained some of the alternatives, which will be put to the respective Elders for approval.

News of the Fellowship


