From Alan Cotgreave—

It is that time of year when schools are organising end of year trips, a time for pupils to have some fun and relax with their friends and for schools to reward pupils for a year of hard work and study. It's a time that teachers either love or hate—it's definitely a "marmite moment". Those of us who love going to Theme Parks (that's where the majority of trips from secondary schools go) absolutely love it, whilst others just see it as a long, stressful day spent continually counting children to make sure you haven't lost them.

I have been privileged to go on two trips to theme parks in the last week, once to Alton Towers with our leavers, those who have just completed their GCSE and A level exams and who are looking forward to a summer of enjoyment whilst waiting for their results.

The second trip was a truly magical experience. I was lucky enough to accompany a trip with our Resource Base students to Drayton Manor. The Resource Base is a unit in our school that works with those who have additional needs and who may not need the full support of a special school but who would not cope fully in a mainstream setting.

Taking them on a trip is very different to taking a mainstream class. At Alton Towers we counted the students off the coach and told them to meet us at 4pm at a particular point. For the rest of the day I was able to do pretty much as I wanted and so I got to do the rides I had planned for myself. The Resource Base students need an adult with them at all times and so as a teacher prepared to go on the rides I was given a group of 8 students who were all up for the thrill attractions in the park.

We had the most wonderful day. These students were so incredibly excited about the day and were so looking forward with a great deal of anticipation to the sensation of the rides. They couldn't help but smile virtually the whole time! They loved the uncertainty of the rides and their faces beamed with total enjoyment for the entire time. It was infectious and my face ached at the end of it all because I had spent so much time smiling with them.

Their looks of wonder and excitement reminded me of Jesus' words in Matthew 18 verses 2-5

²He called a little child and had him stand among them. ³And he said: "I tell you the truth, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. ⁴Therefore, whoever humbles himself like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. ⁵"And whoever welcomes a little child like this in my name welcomes me."

It made me wonder about us as we look forward to our uncertain future. Are we entering into this new phase in our church life with the excitement these young people showed me or are we rather anxious and maybe a little negative about how things will work out?

The big news story over the summer for me has been the opening of



the new ride Hyperia at
Thorpe Park, the largest
roller coaster with more
inversions than any other in
the country. It's been
fraught with difficulties and
has had to close several
times but when it is open I
fully intent to be there to
experience the feeling of

travelling that fast and in so many directions with the same smile of excitement on my face as the young people I had the honour of spending the day with this week.

I pray that as we continue our journey into the future we may feel the excitement and the exhilaration of that ride into the future that God has planned for us and that we may enter into it with the same sense of wonder I saw this week in the faces of the children.

Pastorate Vacancy meeting 19 June 2024

The group representing the 4 proposed churches in our Pastorate group met for the first time on 19 June. The pastorate will be known as South and Central pastorate.

Since we met with Steve Faber back in April the separate churches have been having church meetings to agree or not whether to be part of the pastorate. Three churches agreed to join, those being The Church at Carr's Lane, Weoley Castle and us. Cotteridge Church did not agree because they were concerned about how the future minister's expenses would be shared if it is based on membership numbers.

Having spent some time at the meeting sharing information about our own churches we discussed a way of sharing these joint expenses and came up with a set of figures.

Carr's Lane	44%
Cotteridge Church	20%
Weoley Castle	6%
Weoley Hill	30%

These figures need to be submitted to Synod for approval. Please pray they will be acceptable.

We need to find a pastorate treasurer who will administer this. Any volunteers?

We now have to start to work on our church profile which is to sell ourselves to a prospective minister.

We have exciting times ahead as we learn to work together.

Retiring collections:

July-Barnabas Aid

Barnabas Aid supports Christian communities across the world that suffer repression and hardship.

Christians are the group of people most persecuted for their religious beliefs. In so many countries, there are frequent attacks on Christians and many have little opportunity to earn a living or are allowed to keep their homes, land or places of worship. Not only does Barnabas Aid provide immediate aid, it has established schools, skills training, small loans projects, theological training and agricultural and health projects. Money and resources are channelled through local churches or Christian groups.

Barnabas Aid has recently established Opportunity Africa to help communities in sub-Saharan Africa become self-sufficient, sustainable and resilient, rather than needing repeated support from outside agencies following attacks and climate vagaries. It also includes, the provision of clean water, emergency healthcare and health education and solar powered internet hubs.

We can help support fellow believers, who in great difficulty continue to be faithful.

Eco Tips 3

Saving water.... (just in case we get a hot, dry summer!)

- If you do not have a dual flush toilet then put a stone in the cistern to use less water. A simpler idea is to fill a plastic bag with water, tie it tightly and drop it in the cistern.
- If you are on your own you do not need to flush every time you use it. Remember: "If it's yellow, leave it to mellow, If it's brown flush it straight down!"
- Do not let the water run all the time you are brushing your teeth but just at the finish.
- If you are waiting for the water to warm up when washing up, remember to catch it all in an old milk carton or similar so it can be used on the garden later. Used washing up water is just as good (and the vegetables don't taste of soap). Dishwashers use less!
- Investigate having a water meter from Severn/Trent. It could save you money as well as water. Tel:
