This year we broke with tradition and, although we went to the same area, we chose to stay in an Airbnb rental. We had a large house in which there was plenty of room for each of us to have our own space should we need it. The thought of all six of us contained in the small space of a six-berth caravan for the odd occasions when it might rain did not bear thinking about. As a result we had a fantastic holiday spending much time together as family, which we don't get to do all that often these days but with the opportunity should we need it to be by ourselves.

Time in our own company is important for all of us, time to consider ourselves and just to 'have space' is vital. The more I think about it, the more I realise that this is one of the main attractions for me about my running activities. As I run around Edgbaston reservoir and wonder at how close I am to the city centre given how green, quiet and calm it is, I relish my time not having to think about the clutter of life.

It's time for us all to take heed of the words of that well-loved hymn and "Be still for the presence of the Lord the Holy one is here".

One thing I know for sure is that the Cotgreaves won't be holidaying in a caravan again, I need space to be alone. Alone with God.

Changes to Church Banking

For many years the church has used Lloyds Bank plc (Lloyds) for our banking. The type of account has changed from time to time, but our use has always been free of charge. The present current account is called a "Treasurers' Account".

On 13th November 2025 this will change to a "Charity Account" but, sadly, the charity will stop and charges will be levied on the account.

Our banking use has changed over the years, partly due to the advent of on-line banking and partly due to reduced income from church members. I used to go to the local branch every week to bank cash and cheques. Now the only local branch is in Northfield and I usually go about once a month. The amount I deposit is variable but is often about £800-£900 (mixture of cash and cheques).

The new charges will mainly relate to our 'in branch' banking because we are allowed up to 100 electronic transactions per month free of charge. These are things such as Standing Orders, Direct Debits and bank transfers.

Paying in money at a branch will incur charges of 75p per £100 in cash and 50p per cheque. This is slightly reduced if the money is paid in via an Immediate Deposit Machine to 42p for both types of deposit (I'm not sure if those machines accept coins).

The use of an Immediate Deposit Machine requires a Debit Card which we don't have on our account because we operate a "dual" signature account. This means that cheques require two signatures and any online bank transfers require a second person to approve the transaction. We can have a Debit Card issued for the account but that would enable cash withdrawals to be made by only one person.

A Debit Card would have other benefits. It would enable paying in of cheques and cash at a Post Office. Using the Post Office has been an alternative option, pushed by Lloyds when they have been closing branches, but I have been unable to use it without a Debit Card for identifying the transaction.

Many charities which we support are paid by cheque as the only other alternative offered is by Credit Card on-line (their preferred method). This is the only time I use cheques on the church account.

Finally, it is worth noting that the church does have a card reader for deposits to our account. It does incur a small charge of 0.69% (69p per £100) but may be a convenient way for members to pay into the church account. Lack of use means that it usually stays in the Vestry but is always available.

- If you prefer to continue writing cheques could you perhaps add 50p to the amount you give, or could you consider changing to giving by Standing Order?
- If you already give by Standing Order, please ensure that you
 regularly (annually?) increase the amount you give and not just
 leave it at the same amount when you set it up. Inflation quickly
 devalues the amount.

Part of gold award article from URC website

Now, reader, you might be wondering what steps are taken to achieve the Eco Gold Award for your Church. Well, it involves having an ethos that is environmentally focused which is the focus of your congregation and community. It also involves key documentation and processes such as a comprehensive land management plan and completion of Eco Church's online survey. The Eco Church Survey will tell you whether the answers that you have submitted make you eligible for a Bronze, Silver or Gold Eco Award. Eco Church will also want to interview people from within your Church's Eco team along with looking at your Climate Stewards 360-degree carbon footprint report.

To achieve their gold award, Wombourne URC wrote about the eco garden they planted for the wildlife as well as the Church and members of the public to reflect and enjoy God's creation. They also set up a Church notice board so passersby would be aware of events and service times. There are also reminders to switch off lights and heating as well as implementing temperature limiters in their meeting room. All "A" rated boilers have programmable timers, and many light bulbs are now LED. All toilets are dual flush and are each twinned ("twinning toilets" means you can donate to provide safe water, decent toilets and healthy hygiene to a country of your choice) and they are beginning to buy eco-friendly cleaning products. The congregation and other people who use the hall can also donate items that can be recycled and reused.

The Church's newsletter has a coloured photo each month which invites readers to be thankful for the natural world along with an eco-section that encourages readers to continue to search for and implement sustainable ways to look after the earth. Wombourne URC also have ties abroad and provide resources for those who live in Gambia so they can help themselves to access education and health care.

These implementations are among the wide variety of ways that congregations can continue to steward God's earth. This gives you a glimpse into the actions that lead to achieving a Gold Eco Award and are hopefully encouraged by seeing fellow brothers and sisters in Christ reach an incredible milestone! We, at the Synod, also want to encourage and congratulate everyone for all the hard work they are putting in at each of your churches and hopefully this article has encouraged you in continuing to steward God's creation!

YES PLEASE

All card from around the home. including:

- Cardboard boxes (e.g. cereal boxes, dishwasher tablet boxes).
- Corrugated cardboard.
- Online delivery boxes and cardboard envelopes (Remove all plastic inserts, polystyrene, and packing tape).
- Greetings cards without glitter (Tear off the glitter section, as well as any badges and batteries—the glitter cannot be removed and the card has to be rejected.)
- Egg boxes
- Brown paper.

NO THANKS

- Glitter covered greetings cards. (Check for local recycling via either kerbside collections or collection points)
- Food and drink cartons.

 N.B: These guidelines are for materials commonly collected at kerbside rather than on the go' therefore do not include coffee cups or sandwich hoxes
